2003-2004 Research Assistant Program

All second and third year law students will be allowed to apply for an available position under the Research Assistant Program. Research assistants are selected by faculty members to assist them with projects they maybe working on. The hourly rate is \$7.50 and payment is made bi-weekly through payroll. Generally, a student can work between six and ten hours per week for approximately twelve weeks per semester. Students interested in working as a research assistant during the school year, should obtain an application from Human Resources, Room 5015 in the Deans Suite.
