**\*THE 13TH ANNUAL DAN K. MOORE PROGRAM IN ETHICS\***

Students are invited to attend the 13th Annual Dan K. Moore Program in Ethics on October 3, 2003 from 8:00 a.m. - 12:45 p.m. at the School of Law. The title of the program is "Regulation of Lawyer Conduct: New Federal and State Tensions," and it will focus on the SEC's new rules

issued pursuant to the Sarbanes-Oxley Act relating the conduct of attorneys representing publicly traded companies and the longstanding regulation of lawyer conduct by state bars. The immediate past-president of the American Bar Association and UNC Law grad, A.P. Carlton, will

discuss the response of the states and the ABA to the SEC's rules. Martin Dunn of the SEC will present the SEC's position. Mark Treanor, General Counsel of Wachovia; Russell Robinson, founding partner of Robinson, Bradshaw & Hinson; and Marianne Smythe partner at Wilmer, Cutler & Pickering and former SEC Divisional Director will provide the perspective for the practicing attorney to the potential conflict in lawyer conduct

rules. Professors John Conley, Thomas Hazen and Lissa Broome will provide additional commentary.
