THE SIMON KARAS FELLOWSHIP 2004-2005

This Fellowship offers one new lawyer each year the chance to work as an appellate advocate on cases involving cutting-edge constitutional issues. The Karas Fellow works directly with the State Solicitor, who is appointed by the Attorney General to handle major appeals, along with the Senior Deputy Solicitor and the Deputy Solicitors in the Appeals Section. These lawyers know the importance of one-on-one training and mentoring, and we work hard to make sure that each year's Karas Fellow hones the kind of research and writing skills that are so important for future success in the legal profession. The Fellowship pays a salary of \$52,500, along with the same benefits given to other State of Ohio employees. Interested candidates must apply by November 14, 2003. WELLSTONE FELLOWSHIP FOR SOCIAL JUSTICE

Throughout his Senate career, Paul Wellstone built a reputation as an advocate for social justice and as an outspoken champion for those who lacked a voice in the

national arena. The Wellstone Fellowship provides a unique opportunity to honor Senator Wellstone's memory by promoting equity in health care.

The Wellstone Fellowship is a year-long, full-time, salaried position that will begin in September 2004. The fellow will be engaged in health care advocacy work in Families USA's office in Washington, D.C., where he or she will learn about Medicare, Medicaid, efforts to achieve universal coverage, and other important health policy issues. Specifically, the fellow will be engaged in Families USA's outreach to and mobilization of communities of color. Through this work, the fellow will also learn about conducting health care campaigns, and part of his or her time will be spent working with state-based health care advocacy organizations.

REGISTRATION FOR SPRING 2004

GRADUATION CHECK-OUT APPOINTMENTS REQUIRED FOR 3LS

All 3Ls are required to have a graduation check-out appointment with the Law Registrar in October. Appointments will begin Monday, October 6. Please stop by beginning October 1 to schedule an appointment. An appointment schedule will be in a black binder on the counter top outside Ms. Stroud's office. Each student appointment lasts less than ten minutes and you do not need to bring anything to the appointment. This appointment is very helpful to determine if you have the academic requirements for graduation so please be responsible and schedule an appointment.

FINGERPRINTING FOR BAR APPLICATIONS FOR 3LS

The Law Registrar's Office has coordinated with the Office of Public Safety to provide fingerprinting services for 3L bar

applicants. Fingerprinting will take place in the Courtroom on Tuesday and Wednesday, November 18 and 19 from 8:30am-4:30pm. Fingerprint cards will be provided for North Carolina bar applicants. **IF YOU ARE APPLYING FOR AN OUT-OF-STATE BAR EXAM, PLEASE REQUEST YOUR FINGERPRINT CARDS IN ADVANCE AND BRING THEM ON NOVEMBER 18 OR 19.**

The Office of Public Safety charges \$15 for fingerprinting services (effective July 1, 2003). **THE ONLY METHOD OF PAYMENT WHICH WILL BE ACCEPTED FOR FINGERPRINTING SERVICES IS CASH** so please plan accordingly and bring the exact amount. Mark your calendars because the convenience of being fingerprinted at the law school on a regular school day happens only two days each year.
