JAMES B. MCMILLAN SUMMER FELLOWSHIPS FOR LAW STUDENTS

In 1995, the Mecklenburg Bar Foundation in Charlotte, Mecklenburg County, NC, created the James B. McMillan Fellowship Fund to underwrite summer clerkships for law students with local public service organizations. These fellowships carry an annual stipend of up to \$3,000. Students interested in applying for a McMillan Fellowship are encouraged to make direct contact with the public interest organization or governmental agency in whose work they are interested. In this way, the student and the agency can submit a joint application.

Deadline for applications is March 15, 2004. The Fellowship Fund committee will look favorably on law students who have lived in Mecklenburg County; who intend to practice law in Mecklenburg County; who reflect the cultural diversity of North Carolina and Mecklenburg County; whose law school and life experiences reflect a desire to have a positive impact on the lives of others as their lives are affected by the legal system and its administration; and who have demonstrated good character and suitable academic performance in law school. CABANISS, JOHNSTON SCHOLARSHIP

The Cabaniss, Johnston Scholarship is awarded to a resident of Alabama for the second year of law school. Applicants for a scholarship should be in all respects superior. While academic achievement will be the key factor, consideration will also be given to factors such as conscientiousness, dependability, civic involvement, financial need and dedication to the highest ethical standards. The amount of the scholarship is \$5,000. A second place scholarship of \$1,000 will also be awarded. The deadline for applying for the 2004-05 school year is June 4, 2004. FOUR 2004-2005 CALIFORNIA SENATE FELLOWSHIPS

Fellows receive a monthly stipend of \$1,882 plus full medical, vision and dental benefits. The only prerequisite for the program is a four-year college degree by fall of the program year. The deadline is February 25, 2004.

AMERICAN COLLEGE OF TRUST AND ESTATE COUNSEL MARY MOERS WENIG 2004 STUDENT WRITING COMPETITION

Prizes include \$5,000 for the first-place winner, \$3,000 for the second place winner, and \$1,000 for the third place winner. The deadline for entries is March 1, 2004.

THIRD ANNUAL STUDENT WRITING CONTEST SPONSORED BY THE AMERICAN BUSINESS LAW JOURNAL

The first prize winner will receive a cash award of \$5,000, with up to two additional awards of \$3,000 and \$1,500 available for other outstanding submissions. The deadline is May 31, 2004.

JAMES BOSKEY DISPUTE RESOLUTION ESSAY COMPETITION

All second, third or fourth year law students candidates are eligible to submit an essay to the competition. The winning entry will receive a \$1000 award. The deadline for entries is June 1, 2004.

2004 TANNENWALD WRITING COMPETITION

The first prize is \$3,000, second prize, \$2,000, and third prize is \$1,000. The deadline for submitting papers is June 30, 2004.

2004 NATHAN BURKAN MEMORIAL COMPETITION

Prize money is \$600 for First Prize and \$250 for Second Prize.

The judges may award first, second and third national prizes, for which ASCAP will give cash prizes of \$3,000, \$2,000 and \$1,000 respectively. The national award winners may also be eligible for publication in the Journal of The Copyright Society. Winning papers must be certified to the Society and in our hands by June 30, 2004.

7. OFFICIAL INFORMATION FROM STUDENT AFFAIRS/REGISTRAR'S OFFICE

COMING IN FALL 2004: PERSPECTIVES ON EUROPEAN UNION LAW - LAW 252E

The first half of the course will introduce the students to the foundations and basic principles of European Union (EU) Law as well as the history, structure and institutions of the European Union. The coverage will include the important topics of the Four Freedoms and Fundamental Rights within the EU, certain pivotal directives and cases, the Law of Harmonization and the relationship between EU Law and national law and the crucial

question of enforcement and the building of a European Judicial System will be presented.

The second half of the course will explore in more detail the Fundamental Freedoms of the EU: free movement of goods, workers, natural persons, and services. The course will conclude with an examination of the Law of Competition, covering pertinent case law, regulations and legislation in this field.
