> > Dr. Jeffrey Sonis
> > Justice, Human Rights, and Medicine: Measuring Justice Among
> > Victims of Human Rights Violations
> >
> > March 3, 2005 at 3:30 PM. in Room 5042

> > Please come hear Dr. Sonis who teaches at UNC School of Medicine
> > discuss measuring perceptions of justice among victims of human
> > rights violations in South Africa. Dr. Sonis will describe the
> > multi-dimensional aspects of justice for victims of human rights
> > violations that go beyond punishment, and the effects of
> > testifying before Truth and Reconciliation Commissions.
> >
> > Dr Sonis' research focuses on the psychosocial consequences of
> > human rights violations and epidemiologic research methods. In
> > the past 6 years, he has been the Principal Investigator of four
> > funded projects in that area: 1) a cross-sectional study, funded
> > by the National Institute of Mental Health, of the psychological
> > effects of torture and related trauma among Bosnian refugees seen
> > in primary care settings in Detroit; 2) a cross-sectional study,
> > funded by the Templeton Foundation, of the psychosocial effects
> > on victims of human rights violations in South Africa of
> > testifying before the Truth and Reconciliation Commission; 3) a
> > 27-year retrospective cohort study, funded by the Office of Naval
> > Research, of perceptions of benefit from trauma among Vietnam-era
> > prisoners of war; 4) a population-based telephone survey, funded
> > by the Andrus Family Fund, of community attitudes regarding the
> > first "truth commission" in the United States, in Greensboro,
> > North Carolina. He is also serving as a consultant to the largest
> > study of evacuees from the World Trade Center attacks of
> > September 11. In all of his work, he focuses on outcomes, such as
> > perceptions of justice, that go beyond traditional mental health
> > conceptions of the sequelae of trauma.
